I apologise for not organising a Reunion or Family Gathering. Unfortunately, personal circumstances have prevented it. I will try soon, but will contact you all again when it is possible.

L thought this year that I'd mention some of my 'mystery' people.

Yet again, this involves the family of Samuel Norster who was transported.

He married Joan Gibbs and they had 4 sons :-

Samuel, born 15<sup>th</sup> January 1827, baptised twice, 23rd Jan 1827 at Conygar Lane Weslyan Church, Weymouth, and again 9th Feb 1827 at Parish Church, Portland. More about him later.

**Francis**, Baptised 25<sup>th</sup> January 1829 at Parish Church, Portland. He appears on the 1841 census at Chesil, Portland, then disappears.

Christopher Gibbs, Baptised 11<sup>th</sup> April 1831 at Parish Church, Portland. He appears on the 1841 census at Chesil, Portland, then he disappears too.

William Gibbs, Baptised 12<sup>th</sup> January 1834 at Parish Church, Portland. He appears on the 1841 census at Chesil, Portland, and also on the 1851 census at Fortunes Well, Portland. Then he disappears as well!

Well, not exactly disappears. He marries Ann Hutchings on Christmas Day 1852 and they have a daughter Anne who was baptised 10<sup>th</sup> July 1853 at St Johns church, Portland. Anne went on the marry Richard Elliott from Hadlow, Kent on 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1869 and they produced 11 children between them.

I have a copy of a naval record showing a William Noster, born 7/12/1832, Portland Dorset volunteering to HMS Excellent on 10/3/1854 as a 2nd class ordinary seaman, signing on for 10yrs.

I have him as being christened Jan 1834 (see above). He could have been born Dec 1833 to be the right ages on the 1841 and 1851 censii. He could have added a year to his age (why?to be 21 on enlistment?), or the enlister could have written it down wrong. No age is given in the details.

His wife Ann went on to marry Robert Pearce on 25<sup>th</sup> April 1869 at Weymouth Register Office. I do not yet know if she claimed to be a widow, but I suspect so as divorce was not as easy or as cheap as it is today for ordinary folk.

Williams Naval career of 10 years would have taken him to 1864, and his daughter when she married entered her father's details without the word deceased, as if he were still alive - but that was in 1869 when Ann remarried.

I suppose she could have assumed him dead if she had not heard from him for 7 or more years...

But, and this is a big but, I cannot find any further trace of Francis or Christopher Gibbs Norster or Noster after the 1841 census. There is, as far as I can find, no marriage, burial, entry to the USA, record in Australia or New Zealand. They seem to have dropped off the face of the earth.

I promised more about Samuel, the first son.

At what time he moved I do not know, other than after his father was transported in 1835, and before the 1841 census, but he went to New Zealand, and married Elizabeth Priscilla Vinson (nee Wilson) on 12<sup>th</sup> August 1882.

They had 3 children, William Samuel 20<sup>th</sup> August 1882 who unfortunately lost his life in the First World War, Francis Robert 7<sup>th</sup> February 1885 and Charlotte Emily in 1890. From these are descended all the New Zealand Nosters.
